At the end of February, the Foundation's team faced new challenges as the number of people needing assistance due to the full-scale invasion increased dramatically: Ukrainians lost or were forced to leave their homes. Fleeing danger and seeking shelter, they moved to different oblasts of Ukraine. R2P understood the need to be where there are many IDPs. Therefore, the Foundation has significantly expanded its geography and launched new programmes to provide the assistance the war-affected population required.

“After 24 February, our team did not stop functioning. We evacuated and sought shelter for our families and colleagues, but our work was always with us. As our employees moved to some western oblasts in early March, the geography of our services expanded significantly. We helped wherever our team members were. For example, we started working in Vinnytsia. A team from Donetsk oblast evacuated there and settled in one of the collective centres. There, they began to advise internally displaced residents who were confused and needed support from those who knew how to act. Similarly, our offices appeared in other oblasts that were new to us. The value of our team is that we understand the people we help because we have been through it ourselves.”

THE FOUNDATION'S TEAM



Throughout 2022, Right to Protection (R2P) expanded rapidly. In January 2022, the team comprised 170 people, and at the end of December, there were 1,170 employees. In 2022, specialists from various fields joined the R2P staff. They are not involved in charitable activities, but their experience has strengthened the Foundation's expertise and significantly contributed to the organisation's development.

RIGHT TO PROTECTION'S PROGRAMME DIRECTIONS



LEGAL AID

The lawyers and advocates of Right to Protection (R2P) are a powerful team of professionals. Every year, they provide tens of thousands of free legal consultations on issues related to forced displacement, as well as offline, online, and on-site consultations as part of mobile groups.



PROTECTION MONITORING OF INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS AND THE WAR-AFFECTED POPULATION

R2P analyses the observance of the rights of IDPs and the war-affected population, as well as access to social, medical, and other services; it identifies positive practices and violations and inconsistencies for further advocacy at the local and national levels. The Foundation's specialists monitor the observance of human rights at international checkpoints and

in places of compact residence of IDPs and provide advice, support, and referrals to other types of assistance.



IN-KIND ASSISTANCE

R2P provides high-quality, timely, targeted aid to beneficiaries within the framework of the current legislation, in compliance with security conditions and covering the requirements of the Foundation's partners. The assistance includes food, NFI, WASH, heating equipment, household appliances, and construction materials. It also includes arranging utility rooms, shelters, and minor repairs in social services institutions.



MULTIPURPOSE CASH ASSISTANCE

It is one of the direct assistance programmes that provides cash support to meet the priority needs of beneficiaries arising from the war. The Foundation's team

executes both models of providing cash assistance: as an implementing partner for collecting data and informing beneficiaries about receiving cash assistance and as part of a whole project cycle, where R2P carries out all stages of the process of providing cash assistance to beneficiaries, including disbursement of funds.



MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

The team of psychologists at R2P helps people to understand the experience of war, get rid of post-traumatic symptoms and teaches them to find motivation to move on with their lives. This area provides individual counselling, support groups, educational training sessions, and events and develops the capacity of public social services in hromadas. The main goal of this programme is to help people find internal and external resources and learn about self-help methods in times of chronic stress, loss, and traumatic experiences.



ADVOCACY

R2P implements advocacy activities to improve the current legislation on the rights of IDPs, refugees, and stateless persons. It also aims to reduce the risk of environmental disasters by lobbying for legislative changes and analyses. The Foundation's team works locally, nationally, and internationally.



DISASTER RISK REDUCTION

This programme prevents natural and artificial disasters in Ukraine and mitigates their consequences. The work aims to implement systemic changes to avoid the forced displacement of people caused by such disasters. Within this programme, the Foundation conducts research, prepares analytical reports, develops specialised recommendations, engages in advocacy, holds information events and training sessions, provides advisory and legal support on protecting environmental rights and interests, and provides cash assistance.



SOCIAL PROTECTION

R2P works with hromadas and local administrations to facilitate the integration of IDPs, establishing and building new ties in the hromada. Specialists advise the war-affected population on receiving humanitarian and social assistance and inform them about opportunities and assistance in obtaining social/medical/educational services. In addition, the Foundation helps with transportation and escort to government agencies and healthcare facilities for people with limited mobility.



STRENGTHENING RESILIENCE AND COHESION

This programme is related to conflict resolution, building mutual understanding and dialogue in Ukrainian hromadas at the expert and national levels. The Foundation's team organises platforms for dialogue, coordinates expert community representatives and cooperates with public authorities. R2P attaches great importance to communication and creating unifying narratives, including through artistic tools.



LEGAL AID TO REFUGEES

The Foundation provides free legal help to refugees and asylum seekers in Ukraine. Specialists support cases in court, provide social counselling and support the development of refugee communities, monitor temporary accommodation centres for foreigners, and engage in advocacy and strategic litigation.



LEGAL ASSISTANCE TO STATELESS POPULATION

R2P provides stateless persons free legal support to confirm their citizenship of Ukraine/another country or acquire citizenship and obtain a passport. Specialists organise training sessions and roundtables to increase the capacity and awareness of public authorities and free legal aid lawyers and conduct advocacy activities in citizenship and statelessness.

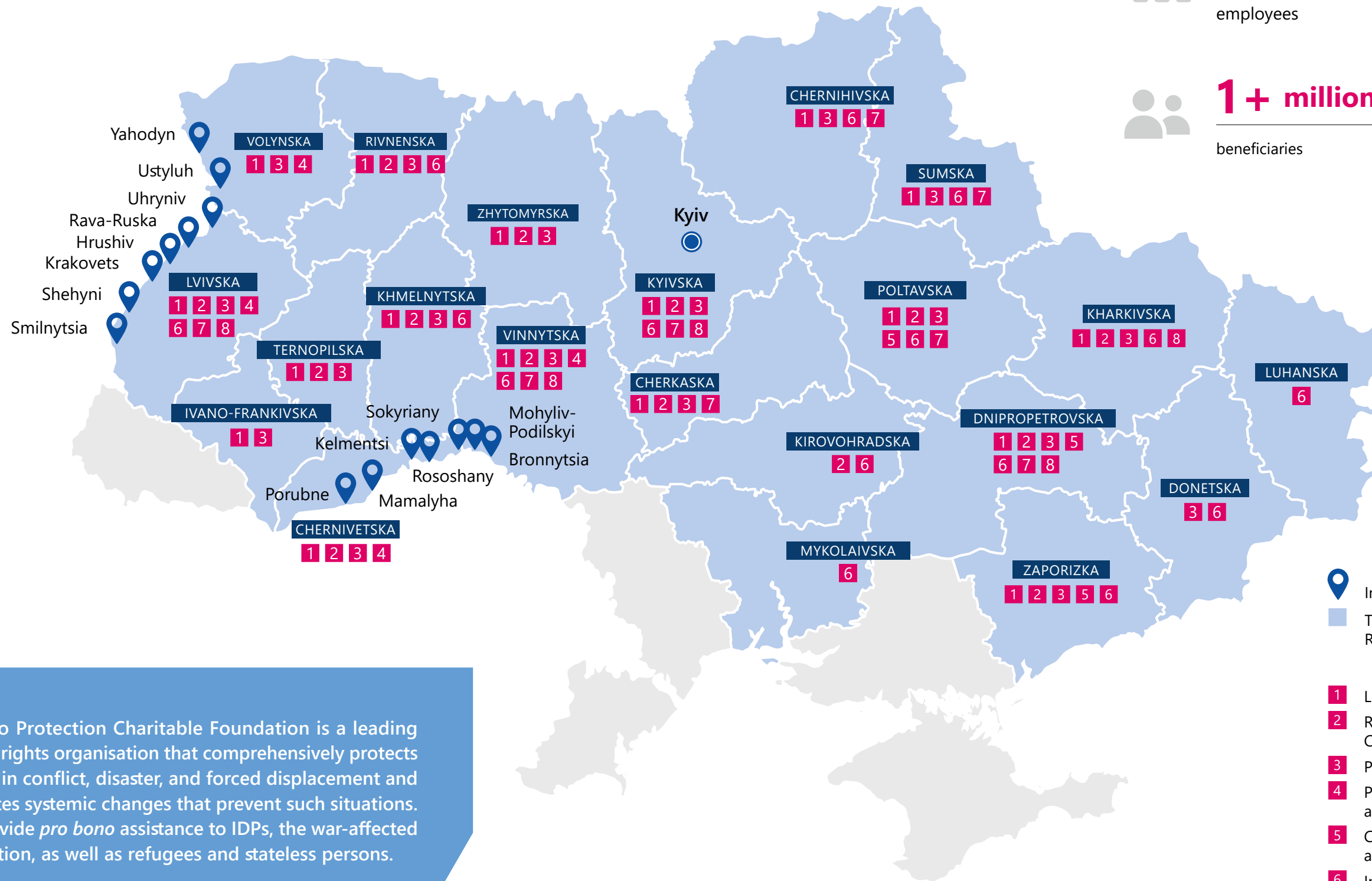

Right to Protection Charitable Foundation is a leading human rights organisation that comprehensively protects people in conflict, disaster, and forced displacement and promotes systemic changes that prevent such situations. We provide *pro bono* assistance to IDPs, the war-affected population, as well as refugees and stateless persons.

LEGAL AID

TO INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS AND THE WAR-AFFECTED POPULATION

In 2022, the Foundation defended the rights of internally displaced persons and the war-affected population in Ukraine. The legal service of Right to Protection (R2P) advised on issues arising from displacement, helped to restore lost records or social benefits, and documented war crimes and state border crossings.

DIRECT PRIMARY AND SECONDARY LEGAL AID

Direct primary and secondary legal aid was provided in 23 oblasts of Ukraine. The legal aid team covered not only regional centres but also remote hromadas as part of mobile groups.

LEGAL HELPLINE

After the full-scale invasion, the Legal Helpline continued to advise people remotely. R2P also introduced a new format of distant consultations through a telegram channel. At the end of 2022, it had almost 25,000 subscribers.

STRATEGIC LITIGATION DEPARTMENT

The Strategic Department of R2P's Legal Service supported 148 national and international courts (ECHR) cases. They concerned compensation for non-pecuniary damage caused by injury and death of a family member, recovery of principal payments by a bank, imposition of penalties on a mortgage loan for destroyed housing during martial law, and violation of other human rights.

THE LEGAL ADVISER FOR IDPS CHATBOT

The chatbot has become an indispensable source of legal information for over 38,000 new users. They had round-the-clock access to free legal aid on forced displacement, documentation of war crimes, etc.

PROTECTION MONITORING

OF INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS AND THE WAR-AFFECTED POPULATION

Until mid-February 2022, Right to Protection (R2P) monitored violations of the rights of internally displaced persons, residents of the "grey zone", and people with vulnerabilities in the eastern hromadas of Ukraine and took measures to protect their rights.

The monitoring team conducted visits to:

- entry-exit control points (EECPs) in Donetsk and Luhanska oblasts;
- Milove and Hoptivka international border checkpoints on the border with Russia. From 24 February 2022, the presence of monitors there became impossible.

From the first days of the full-scale invasion, R2P's monitors provided information support and essential assistance to IDPs (information on evacuation routes, accommodation, humanitarian aid, border crossing, etc.) The monitors were the first link connecting the beneficiaries with other types of assistance provided by the Foundation.

IN 2022, R2P'S MONITORING SERVICE CARRIED OUT:

- monitoring the observance of rights and assessing the needs of IDPs and the war-affected population;
- protection measures, such as counselling, support, local interventions and referrals within the Foundation and to other organisations and institutions;
- identifying the needs for proper accommodation of IDPs, assisting with resettlement, and transmitting information to the relevant local offices of UNHCR and other humanitarian organisations;
- assisting in the preparation and implementation of requests for non-food parcels in compact settlements and local hromadas;
- monitoring of international border crossings;
- surveying beneficiaries to identify existing problems and tendencies in displacement and further planning the response to the humanitarian crisis.

MONITORING AND SURVEYS

16 border checkpoints were covered by regular monitoring visits of the Foundation, during which 3,621 people were interviewed and consulted.

10 focus groups (64 people) were conducted in Kyivska, Chernihivska, Sumska, and Kharkivska oblasts to identify the primary needs and concerns of IDPs and returnees (in October and November 2022 at the request of the Protection Cluster). The Protection Cluster used the findings of the focus groups to inform further planning of humanitarian sector activities.

5,997 respondents were surveyed on access to social rights of IDPs in 17 oblasts and the city of Kyiv.



CAMP COORDINATION AND CAMP MANAGEMENT (CCCM)

In the second half of 2022, R2P began implementing a new CCCM programme (Camp Coordination and Camp Management) with the support of UNHCR. During the year, the programme worked in 4 oblasts: Dnipropetrovska, Zaporizka, Poltavska, and Kharkivska, where it covered 47 CCs with over 4,000 IDPs.

CCCM is an approach that the Foundation has begun to utilise as a widely used international

practice in crisis response to large-scale displacement resulting from wars, disasters, and humanitarian crises. The team focused its efforts on:

- coordination of the activities of the CCs management;
- involvement of the host hromada;
- improvement of living conditions in CCs;
- coordination and monitoring of access to essential services in the host hromada;
- training sessions for CCs' residents;
- legal support for CCs' residents.

IN-KIND ASSISTANCE

TO INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS AND THE WAR-AFFECTED POPULATION

Right to Protection (R2P) launched the In-kind Assistance programme in March 2022 as an urgent response to the request of internally displaced persons and the war-affected population.

The programme's primary goal is to provide high-quality, timely, and targeted assistance to beneficiaries within the framework of the current legislation, in compliance with security conditions and covering the requirements of the Foundation's partners.

In 2022, R2P provided in-kind assistance to:

- internally displaced persons;
- the war-affected population;
- the most vulnerable categories (persons with disabilities, large families, single parents, older people, etc.)

R2P's team cooperated with local governments, social protection institutions, and collective centres to distribute humanitarian aid to the beneficiaries.



NON-CAPITAL REPAIRS IN PLACES OF COMPACT SETTLEMENT OF IDPS AND THE WAR-AFFECTED OBLASTS

In 2022, the Foundation carried out non-capital repairs in establishments that became shelters for internally displaced persons and the war-affected population of Chernihivska oblast:

- 18 affected households in Chernihivska oblast received assistance in the form of construction materials;
- 38 CCs in Poltavska, Dnipropetrovska, Zaporizka, and Kharkivska oblasts received materials for non-capital repairs.

MULTIPURPOSE CASH ASSISTANCE

TO INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS AND THE WAR-AFFECTED POPULATION

Since March 2022, Right to Protection (R2P) has established the Multipurpose Cash Assistance programme for IDPs and the war-affected population. Its launch was part of the Foundation's rapid response to the most critical needs of people forced to move due to the war. In 2022, the programme helped over 700,000 people to access cash assistance.

The Foundation cooperated with international organisations to provide cash assistance to the war-affected population in 2 formats:

1 REGISTRATION OF BENEFICIARIES AT RIGHT TO PROTECTIONS'S DATA COLLECTIVE POINTS WITH SUBSEQUENT PAYMENT OF ASSISTANCE BY INTERNATIONAL PARTNERS

In 2022, R2P collected data on citizens applying for cash assistance from the UNHCR and in cooperation with the Ukraine Humanitarian Fund and People in Need (PIN):

- **686,265** war-affected people from 17 oblasts of Ukraine registered for cash assistance from UNHCR;
- **9,600** people registered for cash assistance from the Czech international organisation People in Need, including funding from the Ukrainian Humanitarian Fund UHF (OCHA) in Rivnenska, Poltavaska, and Kharkivska oblasts.

2 REGISTRATION OF BENEFICIARIES IN RIGHT TO PROTECTIONS'S DATA COLLECTIVE POINTS WITH SUBSEQUENT DIRECT PAYMENT FROM THE FUND

In 2022, R2P implemented 3 full-cycle projects:

- **26,241** people registered under 2 consortia funded by USAID's Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance (BHA): The Response Consortium with ACTED and the Protection Consortium with Save the Children in Khmelnytska, Sumska, Kyivska, Vinnytska, Lvivska, Chernivetska, Dnipropetrovska, and Zaporizka oblasts;
- **14,763** people registered for cash assistance in cooperation with the international organisation HIAS in Kyivska and Kharkivska oblasts.

MOBILE GROUPS FOR COLLECTING DATA ON CASH ASSISTANCE

To ensure that people in remote and hard-to-reach areas can access cash assistance, the Foundation's mobile groups made 1,800 visits to collect data on cash assistance, covering over 400 hromadas.



R2P's Multipurpose Cash Assistance programme has become a transparent and accountable humanitarian response tool. It provided the beneficiaries with open access to information on registration, eligibility conditions and payments:

RIGHT TO PROTECTIONS'S PARTICIPATION CASH WORKING GROUP

Since 2022, R2P has been an active member of the Cash Working Group, a coordinating platform within the UN cluster system that brings together humanitarian organisations operating in Ukraine and implementing cash assistance programmes.



OCHA

MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

TO INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS AND THE WAR-AFFECTED POPULATION

Right to Protection's (R2P's) Mental Health Care Service was founded in March 2022 to respond to the psychological needs of Ukrainians during the war. Throughout the year, the programme team supported adults and children who faced war, were forcibly displaced, lived under occupation, lost loved ones, and suffered emotionally and physically.

TOPICS OF PSYCHOLOGISTS' WORK:

- loss of home or forced displacement;
- loss of a loved one or experiencing another traumatic event;
- expecting the return of loved ones from the frontline;
- anxiety, apathy, deterioration of mood and physical condition;
- emotional exhaustion from helping others (volunteers, social workers, doctors, teachers, etc.);
- sleep disturbances, hand tremors, outbursts of aggression, panic attacks;
- confusion in raising children and misunderstandings in families.

IN 2022, ONLINE AND IN PERSON RIGHT TO PROTECTION'S PSYCHOLOGISTS:

- provided individual crisis counselling;
- held group sessions;
- worked with collective centres (CCs) and shelters;
- strengthened the capacity of social and administrative services in hromadas.

INCREASING THE HROMADAS' CAPACITY, SOCIAL AND VOLUNTEER SERVICES, AND VOLUNTEER ORGANISATIONS

R2P's Mental Health Care Service strengthened the capacities of social sector services, managers and employees of CCs, hromada leaders and employees, SES and civil protection workers, and volunteers.

The team developed and delivered **7 training sessions** to improve the skills of social protection and community management workers and IDPs. **400 seminars and webinars** on various topics were held for organisations and teams caring about others.

KEY TOPICS OF THE EVENTS:

- ways of constructive communication in hromadas;
- methods of providing first psychological aid;
- burnout prevention;
- algorithms for working with people with the most common mental disorders;
- increasing tolerance towards people with mental disorders.

A separate goal from the Mental Health and Psychosocial Support programme's beginning was to educate the war-affected population and those who assisted: local governments and volunteer services and hromadas.



THE PSYCHOLOGIST IN TOUCH TELEGRAM CHANNEL

The team launched the *Psychologist in Touch* Telegram channel as a therapeutic tool for beneficiaries. Experts post there daily to provide simple but effective self-help tools and support the emotional state of people living under chronic stress.

SOCIAL PROTECTION

TO INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS AND THE WAR-AFFECTED POPULATION

Since the beginning of the full-scale invasion in Ukraine, the number of people in difficult life circumstances has increased. In response to these needs, the Foundation expanded its Social Protection of IDPs and the War-affected Population programme.

In 2022, social workers provided free social services in Kyivska, Dnipropetrovska, Vinnytska, Lvivska, Chernivetska, Sumska, and Chernihivska oblasts, such as:

- informing the public about social services provided by the law;
- processing state and other types of assistance in the form of humanitarian, financial, and other benefits for vulnerable categories of society;
- representing the interests of the recipient of social services on their behalf;
- physical support for people with disabilities, as well as intellectual, sensory, physical, motor, mental, and behavioural disorders;
- delivering transport services for people with limited mobility and disabilities;
- utilising case management (an integrated approach to solving a difficult life situation).

To comprehensively address the situation and meet the beneficiary's needs, social workers engaged psychologists and lawyers of the Foundation and interacted with other organisations that:

- assist vulnerable groups and families/individuals in difficult life circumstances within the hromada;
- helped to provide rehabilitation facilities;
- aided in solving social and domestic problems;
- assisted in obtaining medical/educational services.

PROVIDING SOCIAL ASSISTANCE AS PART OF MOBILE GROUPS

To provide social assistance to vulnerable people in remote hromadas of Ukraine, the Foundation introduced mobile groups as a new method of work. In 2022, they operated in 3 oblasts of Ukraine (Kyivska, Dnipropetrovska, and Chernivetska) and covered 18 amalgamated hromadas.

The work of the mobile groups allowed R2P to respond to requests promptly and provide various types of assistance, including social support.

SOCIAL PROTECTION OF CHILDREN

At the end of 2022, social workers of R2P began to provide services in the field of social protection of children in connection with the war, such as:

- establishing communication between IDP families with kids, the management of children's institutions relocated from the East of Ukraine, and hromadas to ensure unimpeded access to medical and educational services for kids;
- mediating social workers in resolving conflict situations related to bullying of IDP children in hromadas;
- promoting the integration and development of internally displaced kids in hromadas by engaging them in participation in activities with their local peers;
- supporting children's state and institutional establishments (psychosocial help for employees, work with professional burnout of staff);
- holding master classes and festive events for children.

R2P experts have strengthened the capacity of hromadas to provide social support to the war-affected population, particularly families raising children and directly kids.



GROUP COUNSELLING OF THE LOCALS ON SOCIAL SERVICES

In 6 oblasts of Ukraine, R2P's Social Protection team held 57 group events for families with kids, including those living in collective centres (CCs) or centres for social and psychological rehabilitation of children.

The main topics of the group events were:

- access to administrative, social, medical, and other services;
- domestic violence prevention;
- child abandonment deterrence and increasing parental capacity;
- employment, healthy lifestyle, and access to other public services, etc.

ADVOCACY FOR THE RIGHTS

OF INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS AND THE WAR-AFFECTED POPULATION

After 24 February 2022, the scope of advocacy for the proper protection of IDPs' social, housing and property rights, as well as freedom of movement and access to healthcare services, was also added:

- protection of children's rights (including unaccompanied children);
- ensuring access to social services;
- the digitalisation of public services.

Such rights were advocated at the international, national, and local levels.

To successfully implement the advocacy tasks, Right to Protection (R2P) closely cooperated with:

- **State authorities**, including the Ministry of Reintegration of the Temporarily Occupied Territories

of Ukraine, with which the Foundation signed a memorandum of cooperation, the Ministry of Social Policy of Ukraine, the State Border Guard Service of Ukraine, and the Verkhovna Rada Committee on National Health, Medical Assistance and Medical Insurance.

- **European Union bodies and international organisations**, such as ECRE, ADC Memorial, and HIAS Europe.
- **Clusters that bring together humanitarian organisations**: the Protection Cluster, which R2P began co-coordinating in 2022; the Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) Cluster, where R2P joined the strategic advisory group, the Shelter and Non-Food Items Cluster and the Health Cluster.



ADVOCACY FOR THE RIGHTS OF INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS

Since the outbreak of full-scale war, Ukraine's infrastructure, including its housing sector, has suffered widespread destruction. Internally displaced persons and the war-affected population needed enhanced social protection from the state, housing solutions, and subsequent integration into host hromadas.

In response to these challenges, R2P's advocacy team made efforts to alleviate the situation of the war-affected population, in particular:

- **Digitalisation of public services.** In July 2022, the Foundation published a study, Experience of Using Public Digital Services. Monitoring Report May-June 2022, in which it recommended that the Ministry of Digital Transformation introduce the possibility of changing the place of residence/stay of IDPs in the Diia app and cancelling the IDP registration certificate.
- **Protection of IDPs' housing rights.** The Foundation's regional teams have repeatedly helped IDPs avoid eviction from CCs and resettle to other places of residence. In December 2022, a national roundtable, Housing Problems of IDPs: Needs, Challenges and Approaches to Solutions, was held to address the housing issues of internally displaced persons.
- **Determining the legal status of the territories of Ukraine under martial law.** Following the Foundation's appeal to the Ombudsman Representative for the Rights of Citizens Affected by the Armed Aggression against Ukraine regarding the need to determine the legal status of the territories where military operations are being (were) conducted or temporarily occupied by the Russian Federation, the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine adopted a resolution that provides legal certainty in the payment of accommodation allowances to IDPs.

ADVOCACY IN HROMADAS

- **Establishing the fact of caring for a person with a disability.** Roundtables were held with the hromadas of Vinnytska and Chernivetska oblasts to present the draft Regulations on establishing the fact of caring for a person with a disability of groups I and II, developed by R2P staff to ensure freedom of movement. As a result, 2 hromadas in Vinnytska and Chernivetska oblasts each approved the draft documents.
- **IDP councils.** R2P is involved in establishing and coordinating IDP councils in different oblasts, including Chernivetska and Kyivska.

ADVOCACY FOR THE RIGHTS OF UKRAINIANS WHO MOVED ABROAD BECAUSE OF THE WAR

Due to the large number of Ukrainians forcibly displaced abroad, it became necessary to change the provisions of foreign laws to ensure the comfortable stay of Ukrainian citizens in the European Union.

RECOGNITION OF UKRAINIAN DOCUMENTS IN THE EU

- **Driver's licence.** Defending the rights of Ukrainians abroad, in June, R2P took part in a hearing of the Verkhovna Rada Committee on Social Policy and Veterans' Rights, where it noted the need to recognise Ukrainian driving licences, as well as to translate them into English and to recognise Ukrainian digital documents as equivalent to paper documents in the EU. The European Council on Refugees and Exiles (ECRE) supported this recommendation in April. In late July, the European Parliament and Council adopted Regulation (EU) 2022/1280, which recognised Ukrainian driving licences in the EU.
- **Digital documents.** The European Council on Refugees and Exiles (ECRE) and the Slovak human rights organisation Liga za lidská

práva / Human Rights League supported initiatives to recognise Ukrainian digital papers and translate them into English, with which the Foundation filed a joint appeal to the Ministry of Digital Transformation of Ukraine. On 16 August, the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine adopted a resolution in which personal data in the Diia app can be transferred to foreign countries to ensure proper access to services for Ukrainians abroad.

PROTECTING THE RIGHTS OF UNACCOMPANIED CHILDREN

In autumn, the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child published its Concluding Observations on Ukraine's combined 5th and 6th periodic reports. It was preceded by a joint NGO report on children's rights during the war in Ukraine, which included a contribution from R2P on the need to establish intergovernmental cooperation for the effective exchange of information with host countries on unaccompanied children. This recommendation is a part of the Committee's Concluding Observations.

NATIONAL EVENTS ORGANISED BY RIGHT TO PROTECTION

December

R2P organised a roundtable discussion, Housing Problems of IDPs: Needs, Challenges and Approaches to Solving Them, broadcast online via Zoom and on the Foundation's official Facebook page. IDPs' housing problems were also discussed on Public TV, Hromadske Radio, and the Suspilne Novyny telethon. In addition to the national roundtable, the Foundation organised local roundtables in Lvivska and Kyivska oblasts dedicated to child protection and access to social services, respectively.



PARTICIPATION IN INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

April, Warsaw (Poland)

International conference, After the War: Rethinking the Future of Civil Society.

May

R2P spoke on behalf of civil society at the 9027th meeting of the UN Security Council on Maintenance of Peace and Security of Ukraine, where, in particular, it emphasised the need to provide housing for war-affected persons and protect unaccompanied children and Ukrainians, stateless persons, and third-country nationals who are forced to flee Ukraine abroad.

September, Brussels (Belgium)

- Roundtable on Taking Stock of the EU's Response to the Ukrainian Displacement, organised by the European Council on Refugees and Exiles (ECRE) and UNHCR.
- Senior Humanitarian Officials' Meeting on the Ukrainian issue, organised by the European Commission on Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid (ECHO), where the Foundation was the only national organisation from Ukraine among representatives of governments and international humanitarian aid organisations.

October, Warsaw (Poland)

An event organised by ADC Memorial-Brussels as part of the OSCE Warsaw Human Dimension Conference.

October, Washington, DC (USA)

Advocacy meeting with congressional aides organised by HIAS. During these events, R2P participated in discussions on providing humanitarian assistance, housing needs of IDPs, protection of unaccompanied children, etc.



LEGAL AID TO REFUGEES AND ASYLUM SEEKERS IN UKRAINE

In 2022, despite the full-scale invasion, the programme team continued to protect and advocate for refugees and asylum seekers access to international protection procedures in Ukraine, their right to liberty and security of persons, and freedom of movement. They:

- provided legal and social counselling;
- supported cases in court;
- monitored temporary accommodation centres for foreigners and stateless persons;
- supported the development of refugee communities;
- were researching the situation of beneficiaries and advocating for their rights.

In addition, the experts carried out analytical work and advocacy to defend those beneficiaries who forcibly left Ukraine.

RIGHT TO EMPLOYMENT

On 21 September 2022, Law 2623-IX allowed asylum seekers in Ukraine to exercise their right to employment, in particular, thanks to the active efforts of the Foundation's legal analysts as part of the working group on the draft law.

ISSUES WITH ACCESS TO INTERNATIONAL PROTECTION PROCEDURES

In 2022, the draft Law on Amendments to Certain Laws of Ukraine on the Protection of the State Border of Ukraine (No. 7475 of 19.06.2022) was submitted to the Verkhovna Rada. It changes the procedure for forced expulsion from Ukraine, restricts the right to apply for international protection at the border, and expands the possibilities for detaining foreigners seeking protection. The Foundation appealed to the Verkhovna Rada's relevant committee and the President of Ukraine not to introduce changes that violate Ukraine's international obligations. The Foundation continues to advocate against the adoption of this draft law.

STRATEGIC LITIGATION

The programme team supported 5 strategic cases in national and international courts (ECHR) on extradition, access to international protection at the border and in places of detention, access to fair trial, and citizenship for children of asylum seekers and persons needing complementary protection in Ukraine.

The Foundation's lawyers won two cases in the ECHR:

- R2P's lawyers stopped the extradition of the asylum seeker from Tajikistan to his country of origin;
- the asylum seeker from Kazakhstan received a 7,500 EUR compensation, as the court found that Ukraine had violated the Convention for the Protection of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms by denying access to international protection.

RESEARCH ON THE DIFFICULTIES FACED BY REFUGEES AND ASYLUM SEEKERS DURING MARTIAL LAW

The Foundation surveyed as part of the research:

300 beneficiaries who moved from Ukraine to the European Union

The analysts studied the scope of the temporary protection policy adopted by the EU and its member states. They received written information from non-governmental organisations about the problems these categories of people face abroad.

168 programme beneficiaries who remained in Ukraine

The survey covered the availability of documents, forced displacement within Ukraine, access to medical services, employment, humanitarian aid, etc.



LEGAL ASSISTANCE TO STATELESS POPULATION

A stateless person is a person who is not considered a citizen by any state under its law. There are about 35,000 stateless people and individuals with undetermined citizenship in Ukraine, caused by the collapse of the Soviet Union, discrimination, gaps in legislation, war and the occupation of some areas of Ukraine since 2014.

In the context of the war, the problems of lack of access to fundamental rights (employment, education, healthcare) for stateless persons were compounded by other issues related to humanitarian needs: access to temporary accommodation in case of forced displacement, access to in-kind and cash assistance from both the state and international organisations.

Due to the loss of documents during the evacuation, destruction of archives, and lack of access to

them due to hostilities, people in Ukraine in 2022 were more likely to be at risk of statelessness.

In 2022, the Right to Protection (R2P) provided legal aid to stateless persons in the following formats:

- legal advice and support, including judicial and before state authorities, on issues of citizenship, statelessness and obtaining statelessness;
- confirming Ukrainian citizenship and obtaining a passport.

ADVOCACY IN THE FIELD OF PROTECTION OF THE RIGHTS OF STATELESS PERSONS

- The Foundation successfully advocated amendments to the Law of Ukraine, On Citizenship of Ukraine, which simplified the procedure for acquiring Ukrainian citizenship for specific categories of persons, including IDPs.
- R2P contributed to the preparation of the joint report of non-governmental organisations, Situation of Children's Rights in Ukraine on 24 February-August 2022 during the War in Ukraine, which resulted in the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child recommending that the Government of Ukraine: grant the right to acquire citizenship to children who do not receive any citizenship at birth, regardless of the legality of their parents' residence/stay in Ukraine, if otherwise, such a child becomes stateless.

- The Foundation successfully advocated for amendments to the laws on the employment of foreigners and stateless persons in Ukraine, which resulted in applicants for statelessness recognition being able to exercise their right to work.

R2P carried out advocacy interventions on:

- the problems of returning stateless persons and persons who left after 24 February 2022 without documents and cannot obtain them outside Ukraine, as well as the possibility of issuing an identity card for returning to Ukraine for stateless persons;
- the possibility of obtaining a temporary or permanent residence abroad and a stateless person's certificate for travelling abroad for people recognised as stateless in Ukraine;
- expanding access to the procedure for recognising statelessness for people serving sentences in prisons and simplifying the conditions for crossing the border for refugees and stateless persons.

INCREASING THE CAPACITY OF PUBLIC AUTHORITIES AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

R2P's staff of the Legal Assistance to Stateless Population programme improved the skills and awareness of the authorities, local self-government bodies, free legal aid system lawyers, and judges regarding stateless persons. Lawyers conducted more than 300 training sessions for over 300 participants:

INTERNATIONAL EVENTS AND ADVOCACY



Within the framework of the European Network of Statelessness international conference Improving Protection for Stateless Refugees (Brussels, Belgium), the Foundation shared its experience of working with stateless persons in Ukraine. It stressed the need to protect the rights of undocumented stateless persons who forcibly left Ukraine under the Temporary Protection Directive in the EU.



Representatives of R2P's Human Rights Protection Programme took part in NGO consultations on establishing and functioning the Global Alliance to End Statelessness initiated by the UNHCR (Istanbul, Turkey), aiming to end statelessness by 2030.



The Foundation shared its experience addressing statelessness with 50 representatives from 29 countries as part of an online course at the International Institute of Humanitarian Law (Sanremo, Italy).

DISASTER RISK REDUCTION

In 2022, Right to Protection (R2P), within the framework of the 3R Consortium (Risk Reduction Consortium), implemented several activities to reduce the risks of environmental and artificial disasters in Ukraine.

ANALYTICS AND ADVOCACY

The Foundation provided recommendations to national-level stakeholders during working meetings with ministries, committees of the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine, and services involved in emergency response, recovery, and reconstruction, which are also outlined in subsequent analytical reports:

- *The Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction as a Tool for Sustainable Development: Peculiarities of Its Application in Peacetime and Wartime;*
- *A Study of the Decarbonisation Process in Eastern Ukraine;*
- *The Impact of Dangerous Environmental and Technogenic Factors on the Health of the Population of Eastern Ukraine;*
- *The Improving the Effectiveness of Disaster Preparedness and Recovery, Rehabilitation, and Reconstruction on the "Better than Before" Principle policy brief.*

The Foundation has made statements on disaster risk reduction and emphasised the importance of rebuilding Ukraine on the principle of "building back better than before" for international stakeholders, in particular in such global platforms:



- **High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development** under the aegis of UN Economic and Social Council (July 5–15, 2022, New York);
- **Seventh Session of the Global Platform for Disaster Risk Reduction** at the initiative of the UN Office for Disaster Risk Reduction (May 23–28, 2022, Bali).

STRENGTHENING CIVIL DEFENCE CAPABILITIES

In 2022, the Disaster Risk Reduction Programme in Ukraine strengthened the capacities of state authorities and hromadas in civil protection and the application of humanitarian principles and international protection standards in an emergency.

ACTIVITIES CARRIED OUT UNDER THE DISASTER RISK REDUCTION PROGRAMME

- an assessment of accessibility and inclusion (convenience, safety, and arrangement of shelters) of social establishments in 26 hromadas;
- in-kind assistance to 21 social establishments, including personal protective and WASH products, information materials, equipment kits, etc.;
- 6 training sessions on applying humanitarian principles and international protection standards for 60 employees of 20 social establishments.

RAISING AWARENESS AMONG THE MEDIA AND HUMAN RIGHTS COMMUNITY ON ENVIRONMENTAL SAFETY

- Our experts held a webinar for over 50 journalists on the problems of water pollution and water resource reduction in Ukraine due to the war.
- R2P implemented a programme of mini-grants for Ukrainian media, which produced 5 pieces of content on the impact of the war on water resources in Ukraine.
- The Foundation co-organised the Environmental Rights and The Role of Local Government in Civil Protection panels at the Human Rights Non-Conference of the Center for Civil Liberties (December 10–16, 2022).



STRENGTHENING OF RESILIENCE AND COHESION IN UKRAINE

After 24 February, the programme shifted its focus from building dialogues and reintegrating the occupied eastern territories of Ukraine to developing tools to strengthen social cohesion in hromadas across Ukraine: between internally displaced persons and their host hromadas, as well as between returnees and their home hromadas.

In the first half of 2022, the Foundation presented and distributed a manual in which experts in social conflict and reconciliation described the methodology of dialogues during armed conflict to resolve and transform societal conflicts, increase social cohesion, and implement change.



RESEARCH ON CONFLICTS AMONG UKRAINIAN IDPS AND HOST HROMADAS, AS WELL AS RETURNEES AND LOCAL COMMUNITIES

In the second half of 2022, the Foundation conducted the *Relationship Practices, Conflicts and Trigger Themes among Ukrainian IDPs and Host Communities, as well as Returnees and Home Communities* studies. As part of the research, R2P conducted 10 focus group discussions and 1,242 individual interviews among Ukrainian IDPs, host hromadas, and returnees and hromadas to which they have returned.

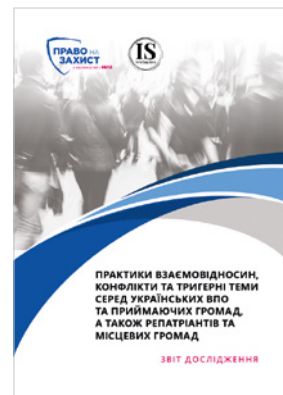

INTERNATIONAL EVENTS



In July 2022, the Foundation joined the collective statement of the participants of the conference, *Connecting and Supporting Ukrainian Civil Society in Time of War*, organised by the Salzburg Global Seminar (Austria). The statement emphasised the crucial role of civil society in rebuilding Ukraine.



In November 2022, R2P presented the results of the *Study of Conflicts and Cohesion Challenges in Ukrainian Communities* at the Fourth International Forum on European Ukraine, *Overcoming the Consequences of Russia's War against Ukraine*, in Berlin (Germany). The Foundation joined the discussions on Russia's war crimes and violations of international law, strengthening international support for Ukraine and the role and challenges for civil society in Ukraine and Europe during the war.



Based on the results of the study, recommendations were made for national and international actors working on the topic of social cohesion and dialogue building in Ukraine at different levels (hromada, expert, and national) on:

- ways to prevent conflicts,
- conflict resolution and reconciliation,
- strengthening understanding and cohesion in the hromada.

Based on the research results, the team directly developed a media campaign to reduce the stigma of internally displaced persons. The campaign's main goal was to spread the right messages aimed at uniting and strengthening cohesion in Ukraine. The Foundation launched the media campaign in January 2023.

- Offline in autumn in Kyiv and Lviv and online in winter, R2P's specialists conducted training sessions, Legal Representation of Asylum Seekers and Stateless Persons under Martial Law: Current Cases, for lawyers of free secondary legal aid centres.

- R2P organised seminars in Lviv: for judges of administrative courts on Peculiarities of Consideration of Cases on International Protection under Martial Law for judges of administrative courts and local general courts on Peculiarities of Consideration of Cases on Detention, Forced Return, Forced Expulsion of Foreigners and Stateless Persons in Compliance with the Principle of Non-refoulement under Martial Law.

LEGAL ASSISTANCE TO STATELESS POPULATION

- R2P organised 2 webinars and 2 offline training sessions in Kyiv and Lviv for lawyers of the free secondary legal aid system on legal protection and documentation of stateless persons, people at risk of statelessness and other undocumented individuals who have difficulties confirming their citizenship of Ukraine or another state. Lawyers from Kyiv, Lviv, Kharkiv, Poltava and the respective oblasts attended the events, as well as those from Donetsk and Luhanska oblasts that were forced to move.



October
November

- R2P held 4 webinars for representatives of amalgamated hromadas and local social protection authorities. The Foundation organised the events to raise awareness of statelessness, possible situations in which people find themselves, and ways to overcome statelessness. It is worth noting that these webinars contribute to the identification of stateless persons, as hromadas and local social protection agencies are the first and often the only ones to whom undocumented stateless persons turn.



December

- R2P's specialists organised a webinar, "Observance of the Rights of Asylum Seekers and Stateless Persons during Martial Law: in Cases of Forced Return, Expulsion, and Establishment of Facts of Legal Significance", for judges of general jurisdiction.



MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT



June

- 4 leading psychological services in Ukraine, Mental Health Care Service of R2P, La Strada — Ukraine, National Psychological Association, and Lifeline Ukraine, discussed the specifics of work during the war, their strengths and weaknesses and ways to cooperate for the common goal of preserving the mental health of the war-affected Ukrainians. They signed a joint document on consolidating efforts and partnerships after the discussion.



July

- The event, Harassment and Exploitation during the War, was held, where representatives of the Mental Health Care Service of R2P, JurFem, Ukrainian Women Lawyers Association "JurFem", La Strada — Ukraine and Strong CF, which provide support and accompaniment to survivors of gender-based violence, discussed the legal, psychological, and social aspects of assisting.



November

- The event, Psychological Front: What Psychological Services are Dealing with in the Tenth Month of the War, was held. 4 leading psychological services in Ukraine, The Mental Health Care Service of R2P, La Strada — Ukraine, National Psychological Association of Ukraine, and Lifeline Ukraine, spoke about how the specifics of work during the war have changed over the 10 months of resilience, shared insights, approaches to work, and the requests they deal with.

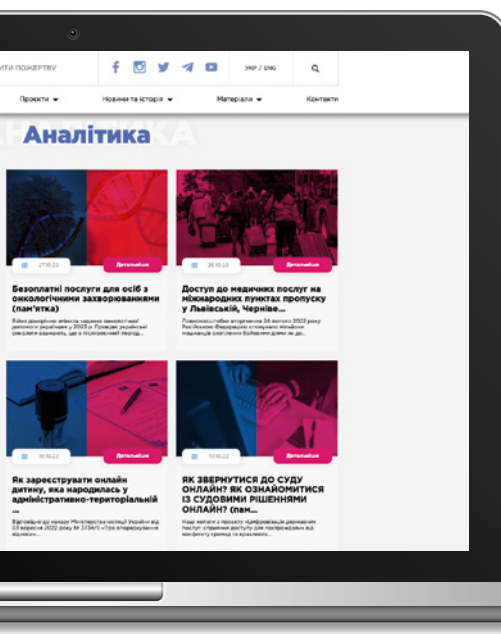

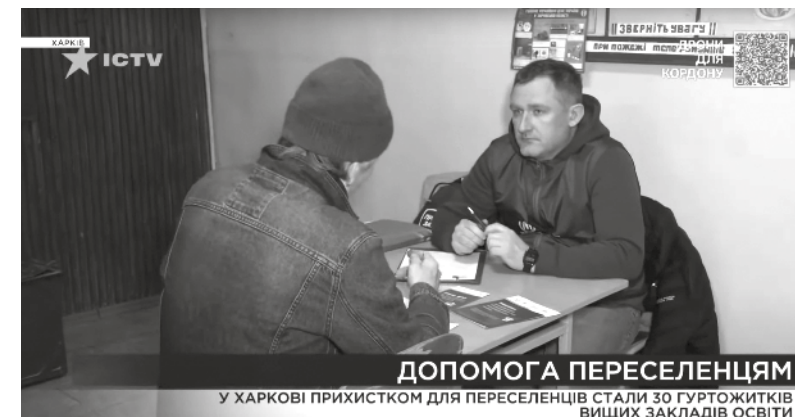

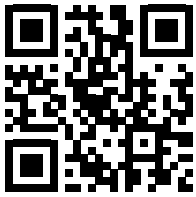
